The City Council/Redevelopment Agency reconvened at 6:43 p.m. in the Council Chambers at 4845 Casa Loma Avenue, Yorba Linda.

Mayor Pro Tem Winder announced that Mayor Castellano is on vacation with his family.

CLOSED SESSION REPORT

City Attorney Carvalho reported there were two items on the Closed Session Agenda and there was reportable action taken on the second item, Item B, which was added as an addendum to the Agenda and involves the Casino Ridge development. This development now has a private homeowners association and the City of Yorba Linda, pursuant to the Subdivision Improvement Agreement, has determined that Woodbridge Developers, the company that constructed the homes in this area, has failed to meet its commitments to that agreement and complete certain public improvements. The City has notified the Surety that it demands payment to complete those improvements and the City Council tonight, by a 3-0 vote, authorized the initiation of litigation if Woodbridge Developers fail to complete the public improvements as required by the Agreement.

INTRODUCTIONS & PRESENTATIONS

PRESENTATION OF DONATION OF \$1,500 BY LEN DRYER, VICE PRESIDENT OF THE YORBA LINDA COMMUNITY FOUNDATION, FOR THE ENTERTAINMENT AT THE FIESTA DAYS FAMILY FAIRE

Mayor Pro Tem Winder stated that the Yorba Linda Community Foundation conducts two major fundraisers a year to help raise money for community organizations and Mr. Len Dryer is here tonight to present a grant to the City of Yorba Linda.

Mr. Len Dryer, Vice President of the Yorba Linda Community Foundation, presented a grant of \$1,500 to the City for the school bus transportation for the marching bands representing the Placentia-Yorba Linda School District at the 2007 Fiesta Days Parade and Family Faire, \$1,500 for the entertainment for the 2007 Fiesta Days event, and \$1,000 for the Holiday in Old Towne program.

Mayor Pro Tem Winder reported that Councilmember Wedaa has requested that all items (12 through 30) under Other Business be continued to the September 18, 2007 City Council meeting when he will be present. Councilmembers Anderson and Horton and Mayor Pro Tem Winder were supportive of the request.

ORAL PRESENTATIONS – ITEMS ON THE CONSENT CALENDAR OR ITEMS NOT ON THE REMAINDER OF THE AGENDA

Pat Nelson, resident, commented on the Metropolitan Water District project and the truck traffic on Valley View Avenue and asked what triggers the left-turn arrow going south on Valley View to left on Imperial Highway. Mrs. Nelson also spoke regarding the damage to Valley View Avenue caused by the trucks and asked who is going to pay to repair the damage. Mrs. Nelson referred to the trash rate increase discussion at the August 7, 2007 City Council meeting and stated her idea of telling the citizens if they did more recycling, their rates wouldn't go up. Mrs. Nelson also asked about the feasibility of getting staff reports on the web site.

Public Works Director Stowell explained that it is a passive/permissive left-turn arrow and the arrow will not come on unless there is a queue of three or four cars waiting in the left-turn lane.

City Manager Letourneau noted that when the City's budget was adopted, it included new equipment for the Council Chambers which also incorporates a new system that will allow not only live streaming of the Council meetings on the web site, but will also have a link to the staff reports.

Upon inquiry from Councilmember Anderson, Public Works Director Stowell stated that the pavement condition of Valley View Avenue is being continuously monitored and if there is damage, Metropolitan Water District has said they will work with the City on that.

Jean Tamulinas, resident, stated that school is starting and she is concerned about the heavy truck traffic on Valley View Avenue – the number of trips and rocks and other debris on the road. She stated that Valley View should not be a staging area for the trucks and they need to be monitored. Mrs. Tamulinas also stated that the wall on Bastanchury Road by the Diemer plant looks horrible and she is not happy with the paving and patch jobs on Valley View Avenue.

Public Works Director Stowell responded that the wall will be covered and the pavement patch jobs are temporary.

Upon inquiry from Councilmember Horton, Public Works Director Stowell responded that the Water District trucks are following very strict rules and will be stopped during school drop-off/pick-up times. He also stated he will check on the staging of the trucks.

Lee Day, resident, reviewed statements she made at the August 7, 2007 City Council meeting and stated that the residents of the area San Antonio Road east (approximately) only pay \$19.47 per parcel and have had no increase for the past three years; and the customers of the Yorba Linda Water District pay an annual fee of \$42.00 and she has been advised that the Yorba Linda Water District Board has authorized a \$2.00 a month increase. Mrs. Day also discussed Anaheim Hills berms/landscaping, Esperanza Road medians, and arterial benefits.

Ben Li, Jie Li, Lingyun Zhao, Hongwei Lou, and JiPing Liao passed out information, addressed the City Council regarding genocide persecution of Falun Gong practitioners by the Chinese Communist Party in China, and asked the City Council to pass a Resolution to end persecution all over the United States.

Rick Noonan, resident, stated he lives in senior apartments and requested that Council consider giving senior apartments a trash refund.

Louie Scull, local business property owner, stated he was exiting the Home Depot section in Anaheim Hills on the access road to Weir Canyon Road and found he could only turn left and not go straight across to Yorba Linda. Mr. Scull stated that a change should be made so that motorists can go straight across to Yorba Linda or turn left.

Mayor Pro Tem Winder advised that there are underpasses on the right and left side which takes you onto Yorba Linda Boulevard.

Walter Bruckner, resident, referred to discussion at the August 7, 2007 City Council meeting regarding the residents who live in the county island and stated that these people do not want to be in the City limits as they have voted "no" to annexation to the City of Yorba Linda at five previous elections. Mr. Bruckner stated that a Wal-Mart and a Target is needed in Yorba Linda as well as a gasoline station at Costco. Mr. Bruckner presented an article from the Wall Street Journal stating it is fiscally irresponsible to take money out of the reserves.

Nancy Rikel, resident, spoke relative to the 3-2 vote against spending City funds to plant/maintain trees in the county area by the Imperial Highway overpass at Esperanza Road and suggested that residents buy living Christmas trees and donate them for planting in that area. Mrs. Rikel stated she thinks there should be conflict of interest investigations by the Fair Political Practices Commission when a Councilmember accepts a pension from the Police Department yet is allowed to negotiate a contract with the Brea Police Department; and a Councilmember accepts a contribution from the Orange County Professional Firefighters Association and is sitting on the Board of the Fire Authority. Mrs. Rikel also addressed other issues.

Upon inquiry from Mayor Pro Tem Winder if the County had an opportunity to challenge the failure of Anaheim to mitigate their portion of the length of the whole wall on Esperanza Road, City Manager Letourneau stated that everyone had an opportunity to respond when the environmental impact report was published.

Mayor Pro Tem Winder noted that one point made by the speaker was personally addressed to him as he is the only person on Council with a pension from the Brea Police Department, and that at his own volition, he asked for the Attorney General's opinion on that very issue and the Attorney General opined that there is no conflict of interest and that opinion is a published document.

The City Council/Redevelopment Agency approved the reading by title of all ordinances and resolutions and declared that said titles which appear on the public agenda shall be determined to have been read by title and further reading waived.

The City Council approved second reading and adopted Ordinance No. 2007-903.

3. RESOLUTION NO. 2007-3875 PROCLAIMING OCTOBER 27, 2007 AS FIESTA DAYS IN THE CITY OF YORBA LINDA

The City Council adopted Resolution No. 2007-3875.

4. RESOLUTION NO. 2007-3876 – ESTABLISHING FEES AND SECURITY DEPOSITS FOR THE USE OF THE TOMMY LASORDA JR. FIELD HOUSE AND TRAVIS RANCH ACTIVITY CENTER

The City Council adopted Resolution No. 2007-3876.

5. APPROVAL OF PARCEL MAP 2005-117 AND ACCEPTANCE OF SUBDIVISION IMPROVEMENT AGREEMENT, SOLESBEE FAMILY TRUST

The City Council approved Parcel Map No. 2005-117, authorized the City Clerk to certify the record map upon completion of any technical corrections required by the City Engineer, and authorized the Mayor to sign and the City Clerk to attest the Subdivision Improvement Agreement.

6. REPLACEMENT OF CITIZEN CONTACT RECORDERS

The City Council appropriated \$38,879.94 to pay for the City's share of new Digital Voice Recorders to be purchased by the City of Brea.

7. CONTINUED PUBLIC HEARING REGARDING RESOLUTION NO. 2007-3870, CONFIRMING THE REPORT OF COSTS OF ABATEMENT OF WEEDS, RUBBISH, REFUSE, AND DIRT PUBLIC NUISANCES, AND IMPOSING SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS AS LIENS ON PARCELS WITHIN THE CITY OF YORBA LINDA

- a. Open Public Hearing – Mayor Pro Tem Winder opened the public hearing.
- b. Staff Report – Community Development Director Christiansen presented the staff report.
- c. Take Testimony

Joe Heffington, resident, stated that he thinks there is an error in the magnitude of his bill of \$1,569.60 for Parcel No. 351-442-06 and asked for consideration in reducing the amount charged to his property. He stated the estimated cost by the City was \$500.00, and in 2003 when the City did the abatement on his property, the cost was \$398.00.

Community Development Director Christiansen gave a comparison of Mr. Heffington's 2003 bill and the 2007 bill.

Mr. Heffington responded to questions from Council and discussion ensued.

- d. Close Public Hearing – Mayor Pro Tem Winder closed the public hearing.
- e. Make Determination

Councilmember Anderson stated that he believes the estimate was seemingly realistic based on what the prior charge was.

Upon inquiry from Council, City Attorney Carvalho explained the process to be followed.

Councilmember Anderson made a **MOTION** to compromise and in this specific instance charge Mr. Heffington \$720.00 for Parcel No. 351-442-06.

Mayor Pro Tem Winder **SECONDED** the **MOTION** for discussion but stated he will be voting "no" on the motion.

Upon comment from Councilmember Horton that she would like to have more information and not go forward with this tonight, Community Development Director Christiansen noted there is a time issue and in order for this to make the next tax roll, it needs to be acted on tonight.

Discussion ensued.

RECESS:

Mayor Pro Tem Winder called a recess at 8:00 p.m. and reconvened the meeting at 8:15 p.m.

It was **MOVED/SECONDED – ANDERSON/HORTON** – to adopt Resolution No. 2007-3870 absent Parcel No. 351-442-06. **MOTION CARRIED** by the following roll call vote.

Community Development Director Christiansen explained the estimate and how estimates are made. He also noted that this contractor has been doing the weed abatement in the City for at least the last five years.

City Attorney Carvalho explained the vote process.

Councilmember Anderson stated that from the homeowners perspective, it was a reasonable reliance that the \$500.00 estimate was in the “ball park” based on the past history of a \$400.00 bill. He also stated he does not understand how there can be a 300 percent increase and urged that \$720.00 was a fair compromise.

Mr. Heffington responded to questions from Council.

Councilmember Horton requested staff to revisit how estimates are done.

Discussion ensued.

The original **MOTION** to compromise and charge Mr. Heffington \$720.00 **FAILED** by the following roll call vote:

Community Development Director Christiansen responded to questions from Council.

COUNCILMEMBER HORTON made a **MOTION** to impose a weed abatement charge of \$1,200. **MOTION FAILED** for lack of a second.

It was **MOVED/SECONDED – WINDER/HORTON** – to charge Mr. Heffington \$1,000 for Parcel No. 351-442-06.

Upon Councilmember Anderson stating he will be voting “no” - that someone needs to be an advocate for the people, Councilmember Horton stated she is an advocate for the entire City.

MAYOR'S REPORT

Mayor Pro Tem Winder reported that Black Gold Drive is now open, and that he attended the Relay for Life event in Yorba Linda on August 10, 2007. Mayor Pro Tem Winder reported he received the Executive Summary of the 2006/2007 Grand Jury Report and the main focus was the question “Does the schools’ emergency plans include all the components of SEMS (Standardized Emergency Management System)”. The Grand Jury asked the schools throughout Orange County – are there personnel assigned to various positions, are there back-ups for all positions, are the assigned persons trained for their duties, and do they perform drills based on the plan. The Grand Jury’s conclusion was that there are few schools that have a well developed plan to assist them in coping with a major incident.

Upon inquiry from Mayor Pro Tem Winder, City Manager Letourneau stated that the answer for Yorba Linda to all of the Grand Jury questions is “Yes”, and this year in October, the City is planning a multi-agency functional exercise.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY COUNCILMEMBERS

Councilmember Horton reported that Claire McKenna is leaving the Yorba Linda/Placentia Family YMCA after 20 years of service for a new position as Executive Director of the North Orange County YMCA.

Councilmember Horton stated that in response to comments made by a speaker tonight, she does sit on the Orange County Fire Authority Board of Directors and she did accept a campaign contribution from the Orange County Professional Firefighters Association and she did check with the Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) before and after she accepted the contribution. She stated there are rules in that she cannot deliberate or vote on items like their benefits, raises, et cetera, but there is a statute of limitations on that and FPPC deemed she did not have a conflict and it was not unethical.

Councilmember Horton reported she participated in the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life and it was an amazing event – the community came together and there was so much support and caring. She stated she wanted to recognize Patricia Martinez and Kate Spector from the Library who coordinated the entire event.

Assistant City Manager Gruchow stated that the City and the Library each had a separate team walking in the event, but Patricia and Kate were the co-chairs of the event for the second year in a row and they did an awesome job.

Mayor Pro Tem Winder noted that it was a great level of involvement and quite a tribute to staff's commitment to the community.

Councilmember Anderson reported that something has occurred in the City of Placentia and City of Anaheim that impacts the City of Yorba Linda greatly - it is a lack of noise and it is amazing the impact Placentia's "quiet zone" has had since it went into effect Saturday morning. He stated that watching trains come through at-grade crossings without blowing the horns the way they had been is almost miraculous in its impact on Yorba Linda. Councilmember Anderson personally thanked the City Council of the City of Placentia for their dedicated efforts to get "quiet crossings" and urged everyone to obey the crossing so that this "quiet zone" can remain in place. Councilmember Anderson also reported that when the air compressors are on line, they will also result in significant benefits to Yorba Linda citizens. Councilmember Anderson stated that the trees going in now in front of the wall on Esperanza Road are really going to help in a few years, and he is happy to be part of the vote to extend the trees down to Hidden Hills so those residents get the benefit of mitigating a significant environmental impact that they have lived with so many years.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS

8. RESPONSE TO PUBLIC COMMENT QUESTIONS CONCERNING FRIENDS CHRISTIAN HIGH SCHOOL LEASE AGREEMENT

City Attorney Carvalho presented the written staff report.

Pat Nelson, resident, discussed issues she has with the agreement and stated if they miss one payment she hopes they are out of there.

Rick Noonan, resident, asked where the people from the school are and can they be notified.

Lee Day, resident, spoke relative to the extension of time and stated she objects to quarterly payments.

Upon inquiry from Councilmember Anderson as to what happens if there is a single missed payment, City Attorney Carvalho responded that the default provision is that the City gives a three-day written notice of the default. After giving the proper notice required by law because this is a landlord-tenant situation, if the City still does not receive payment within the legal time frame, then the City can declare the default and can repossess the property and have them evicted from the property.

The City Council received and filed the report.

9. REPORT OF PLANNING COMMISSION ACTIONS FROM THEIR LAST MEETING/APPEAL OF PLANNING COMMISSION ITEMS AND TOWN CENTER BLUE RIBBON COMMITTEE UPDATE

Community Development Director Christiansen gave a recap of Planning Commission actions from their August 15, 2007 meeting and an update of the Town Center Blue Ribbon Committee.

Community Development Director Christiansen responded to questions from Councilmember Anderson relative to the noticing of the Etco development project by the Yorba Linda Lakebed Park.

10. FIRST READING OF ORDINANCE NO. 2007-905 – AMENDING THE REDEVELOPMENT PLAN FOR THE YORBA LINDA REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT AREA, TO SATISFY THE REQUIREMENTS OF SENATE BILL 53 AND DIRECTING AGENCY STAFF TO RECORD A REVISED STATEMENT OF PROCEEDINGS

City Attorney Carvalho reviewed the written staff report and responded to questions from Council.

It was **MOVED/SECONDED – HORTON/ANDERSON** - to approve first reading of Ordinance No. 2007-905. **MOTION CARRIED** by the following roll call vote.

11. FIRST READING OF ORDINANCE NO. 2007-904 – ADDING SECTION 8.05 TO TITLE 8, HEALTH AND SAFETY OF THE YORBA LINDA MUNICIPAL CODE TO PROHIBIT THE PLANTING, CULTIVATION OR MAINTENANCE OF OLEANDER PLANTS ON PUBLIC TRAILS

Public Works Director Stowell gave an overview of the written staff report and responded to questions from Council.

Discussion ensued.

Mary Carbone, resident, stated that oleander plants are deadly to horses and humans and the City of Norco does not allow oleanders in the City. Mrs. Carbone noted that Richfield Road from Yorba Linda Boulevard down to Orangethorpe Avenue is bordered by oleanders and she would like to see a Citywide prohibition of oleanders, more public awareness, and that those residents who border the trail and who have oleanders in their back yard trim them back so that horses cannot reach them over the fence and that the leaves cannot fall on the trail – a local horse died from eating one little oleander leaf that was on the trail.

Mrs. Carbone responded to questions from Council.

Upon inquiry from Pat Nelson, Public Works Director Stowell responded that the estimated cost of public oleander plant removal along trails and within 50 feet of public trails is \$108,000.

It was **MOVED/SECONDED – HORTON/ANDERSON** – approve first reading of Ordinance No. 2007-904, that includes Option 3 to prohibit oleander plants on trails and in zones that permit equestrian uses as a matter of right, and with an additional requirement that anything surrounding these defined areas within ten feet.

Discussion ensued.

Mayor Pro Tem Winder stated that he cannot support the motion because of the intrusion of Council directing what people can plant and cannot plant on their own private property.

City Attorney Carvalho clarified that to the Ordinance attached to the staff report, this motion would be adding a Section 8.05.040 to reflect Option 3 with two changes – you would add the word zones “or within ten feet of such zones”, and add proposed language at the very end that says “this section shall be removed by the owner of the property on which such plant is located”. This Ordinance would then prohibit oleanders on public trails as well as those zones identified in Option 3.

A **SUBSTITUTE MOTION** was made - **MOVED/SECONDED – ANDERSON/WINDER** – to continue this item to the September 18, 2007 City Council meeting. **MOTION CARRIED** by the following roll call vote.

ORANGE COUNTY SANITATION DISTRICT – Mayor Pro Tem Winder reported that he and Councilmember Anderson have been attending goal-setting sessions that involve a variety of operations for the Sanitation District and service levels in the future, and those sessions have been productive.

ORANGE COUNTY DIVISION OF THE LEAGUE OF CALIFORNIA CITIES – Mayor Pro Tem Winder reported that the Orange County Sheriff addressed the group on a variety of issues at the meeting.

FOOTHILL/EASTERN TRANSPORTATION CORRIDOR – Councilmember Horton reported that the Transportation Corridor System Board was formally formed at the last meeting and it was funded by the Foothill/Eastern and San Joaquin Transportation Corridors.

ORANGE COUNTY FIRE AUTHORITY – Councilmember Horton reported that the Orange County Fire Authority had been looking at regionalization of their ambulance services and the Board voted at the last meeting to place this project on hold.

ORANGE COUNTY VECTOR CONTROL – Mayor Pro Tem Winder reported that it is the 60th Anniversary of the Orange County Vector Control this year.

TRANSPORTATION CORRIDOR SYSTEM – Report given under Foothill/Eastern Transportation Corridor.

Councilmember Horton announced that Planning Commissioner Haack has resigned as of the end of this month and she wanted to publicly thank him for his years of service on the Planning Commission.
