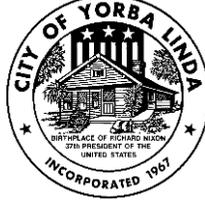

## **INTRODUCTIONS & PRESENTATIONS**

### **PRESENTATION BY YORBA LINDA SPOTLIGHT THEATER**

Director Andrea Fouts gave a brief history of the Yorba Linda Spotlight Theater and spoke of the immediate need for a theater in Yorba Linda.

Eve Tibbs, resident, described the type of theater that was needed.

Heather Reekstin, resident, said her children are involved in the arts and she supports building a theater in Yorba Linda.

David Michelle, resident, spoke in support of a theater in Yorba Linda.

#### ORANGE COUNTY FIRE AUTHORITY PRESENTATION OF THE RESERVE PROGRAM BY DIVISION CHIEF MICHAEL MOORE

Councilwoman Rikel presented a slideshow of the OCFA Reserve Program and reviewed the Ad Hoc Committee findings and recommendations.

Division Chief Michael Moore gave a short presentation and responded to questions from Council.

#### PRESENTATION OF PROCLAMATION FOR PUBLIC WORKS WEEK

Assistant City Engineer Jacquelyn Niemi gave a power point presentation and brief snapshot of the responsibilities of the Public Works Department.

Mayor Schwing presented a Proclamation to Assistant City Manager/Director of Public Works Stowell for National Public Works Week.

#### **PUBLIC COMMENTS - ITEMS ON THE CONSENT CALENDAR OR ITEMS NOT ON THE REMAINDER OF THE AGENDA**

Pat Nelson, resident, said there is still graffiti and damage to the horse trail along the El Cajon Trail and asked if anyone was handling it. She suggested placing waste bags and trash cans on the trail that begins at Prospect Avenue and Wabash Streets as many people walk their dogs there. She said RRM Design Group was meeting with various residents in the City to discuss the Town Center Specific Plan and she asked how that list of residents was determined.

Interim City Manager Kelly said he would research the information and respond to Mrs. Nelson.

Bob Hansen, resident, was concerned about solicitors coming to his home. He asked if the City could develop a policy of not allowing ex-convicts to solicit door to door.

City Attorney Carvalho elaborated on the solicitation permit process. She has spoken with staff and stated a review of current regulations is needed. Ms. Carvalho also addressed trespassing on private property and what other communities are doing to dissuade solicitors.

Councilwoman Horton inquired on the status of the regulations review.

Interim City Manager Kelly indicated that a code update should be ready in the near future.

Betty Gillaspy, resident, said she objects to the practice of censorship and does not want to limit information to residents no matter where it originates.

Dee Dee Frederick, President of Yorba Linda Country Riders, thanked staff for several recent efforts including re-opening the El Cajon Trail and sending a letter of support for the Orange County Equestrian Center. She submitted a picture showing that part of the trail off of Eureka Avenue was fenced off. Ms. Frederick requested connectors on the trails especially off of Yorba Linda Boulevard. She also asked the status on placing lights at the parking lot of the Phil Paxton Equestrian Center.

Assistant City Manager/Director of Public Works Stowell presented the staff report and responded to questions from Council.

Mary Carbone, resident, would like to see something added to the General Plan to preserve and protect the atmosphere of this street and others like it.

Ed Rakochy, resident, spoke in opposition to the no parking restriction on Grandview.

Pat Nelson, resident, said the no parking signs seem excessive and suggested instead painting a dashed line on the street.

Claudine Lynch, resident, suggested posting a sign that warns of rural or narrow roads ahead.

Earl Carbone, resident, spoke in opposition to the no parking restriction.

Gloria Newell, resident, lives in the neighborhood and said she has never noticed a problem or had any trouble.

It was **MOVED BY WINDER** – to approve Resolution 2009-3991 to prohibit street parking on the west side of Grandview Avenue between Buena Vista Avenue and Linda Verde Street. **MOTION DIED** for lack of a second.

It was **MOVED/SECONDED – ANDERSON/RIKEL** – to direct staff to eliminate the double yellow line and replace it with a dashed yellow line; to come back to Council in one year and report on the impact to the neighborhood and if any safety issues are noted before one year, staff can report back to Council.

City Attorney Carvalho stated that staff would like the opportunity to review the street plan to make sure it would not present a safety hazard that would put the City in a difficult situation.

28. REVISED MASTER PLAN FOR LUCIA KUST PARK

Parks and Recreation Director Leto stated that S & S has requested a continuance of the item.

Mayor Schwing stated the request is not recognized as Council policy required advance notice of such a request.

Parks and Recreation Director Leto presented the staff report and responded to questions from Council.

Stephanie Gasca, PCR Services Corporation, spoke about the need for a biologist to be on the park site during removal of any vegetation due to its riparian condition.

Lyle Overby, Shapell Industries, Inc., gave a history of the Lucia Kust Park site and stated he had requested a continuance to submit additional data to the Council.

Lee Day, resident, said Council needs to decide whether the revised plan incorporates enough public benefit to justify the expenditures of general fund monies for long-term maintenance. She also stated Lucia Kust Park should not be accepted until Shapell Industries, Inc. abides by all conditions of approval and the City gets an active park bought and paid for by them.

Tom Lynch, resident, suggested that Council study the history before Shapell Industries, Inc. developed the property. He said Lucia Kust Park can be designed as a no-maintenance park but it would have to be extremely passive. He also said Shapell Industries should maintain the park until they have finished constructing the housing development.

Claudine Lynch, resident, said the City does not need a nature park and should not spend any money towards maintenance. She also said the City should make Shapell Industries, Inc. clean up the park.

Ann Ryecliff, resident, thanked Director of Parks and Recreation Leto for holding informational meeting on site. Ms. Ryecliff mentioned her concerns with the proposed park, including fencing, the sprinkler system box behind her property and inquired about the timeline for completion.

Unknown resident is concerned about proposed trees blocking his view and asked what would be the height of the trees.

Dan Smith, landscape architect, replied that oak trees are slow-growing to approximately 30 feet at full maturity.

Pat Nelson, resident, suggested the City retain lots A & C, keep them as natural as possible for low maintenance and allow Shapell Industries to keep the middle section.

Ed Rakochy, resident, suggested not paying any money for maintaining the park and letting the developer be responsible for it.

It was **MOVED/SECONDED – SCHWING/RIKEL** – to continue the revised Master Plan to a future Council meeting and allow the City Attorney to meet with Shapell Industries, Inc. **MOTION CARRIED** by the following roll call vote:
